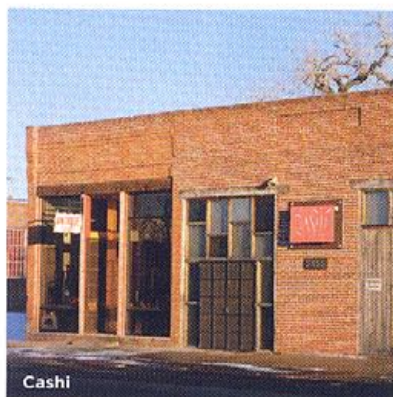
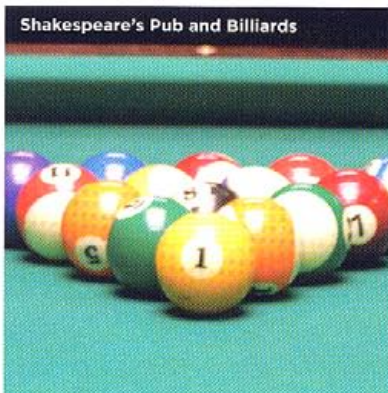


# Walnut Street

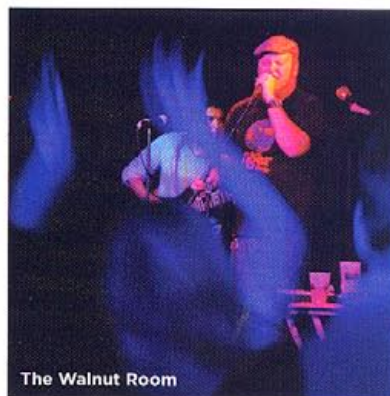
The still-developing Walnut Street corridor, between Broadway and 38th, connects LoDo's lofts and bars to RiNo's burgeoning gallery scene.



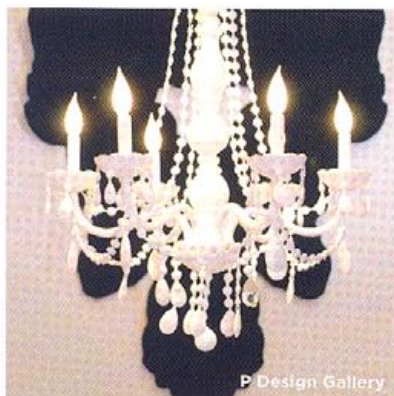

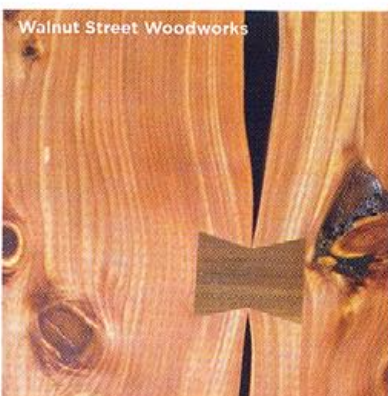

We love its hip, no-frills, industrial feel and the unexpected finds. Next time you're driving down Walnut, slow down and check out our favorite spots, or discover a few of your own.

**P Design Gallery** (2590 Walnut St.) feels more like a modern art museum than a design store—featuring limited-edition contemporary furniture, jewelry, and art from emerging designers like Tobias Wong. Best part: You can actually sit on, put on, or take home what you discover. Formerly on Platte Street, **Shakespeare's Pub and Billiards** (2620 Walnut St.) relocated to its bigger and better location on Walnut this December. With 21 billiard, snooker, and pool tables in a beautiful, wood-paneled, hangar-size room, we think it's better than the original. **Erico Motorsports'** (2855 Walnut St.) expansive showroom is packed full of Vespa, Triumph, and Ducati bikes, among others, plus a friendly staff that knows its stuff. **The Walnut Room** (3131 Walnut St.)—across the street from a junkyard—books big-name musicians (Ben Folds, Chris Isaak, and the Subdudes) and local bands to its intimate stage. Swing in for the signature Mile High Club Pie pizza and a PBR on draft, before catching a show. At **Walnut Street Woodworks** (3440 Walnut St.), furniture makers Chris Connors and Tom Diess create custom, one-of-a-kind tables, desks, headboards, and more. Score hard-to-find 18th- and 19th-century Asian antiques at **Cashi** (3458 Walnut St.), where owner Steve Thurston will chat you up about his travels to China and the Philippines.
